MY MATE FANCIES YOU - THEATRE IN EDUCATION PROGRAMME IMPACT REPORT





Since 1994, Loudmouth Education and Training has been supporting schools, organisations and partnerships with their relationships and health education programmes.

Loudmouth creates and delivers theatre in education programmes to support children and young people to have healthy, happy and safe lives. Loudmouth run over 1,000 sessions a year, to over 100,000 children and young people a year.

My Mate Fancies You is Loudmouth's theatre in education programme for Year 5 to Year 7. This looks at puberty, growing up and the transition from primary to secondary school.

In 2023, Loudmouth ran a total of 82 sessions of My Mate Fancies You, a theatre in education programmes on puberty, growing up and the transition from primary to secondary school.

We reached 5,389 young people aged between 9 and 11 years old across the UK.



The My Mate Fancies You programme...

- Consists of performances, character/s Q&A and a workshop that includes local and national signposting to partner support organisations.
- Teaches the children key facts about puberty including physical and emotional changes including awareness of menstruation as well as ideas for managing the move from primary to secondary school.
- Is led by Loudmouth's safeguarding trained actor/facilitators and are delivered in a safe, appropriate and trauma informed way.
- Can be run as live or virtual sessions.
- Is accompanied by teachers' resources to support our visits, this would include lesson plans and signposting information.

"My Mate Fancies You is possibly the most important afternoon these children have. It is a safe insight into puberty and prepares them for secondary school."

99% of all students evaluated said they thought that the My Mate Fancies You programme helps children to learn about growing up and puberty. Examples of why are shown below.

"Because it teaches people about the changes that will happen to you."

"Because they make it funny but educational."

"It shows that all of us experience something during puberty and nobody is alone."

"Because it helps me feel more comfortable talking about it."



Example responses from students when asked 'how they would act or behave differently...'

"I know who to ask for advice and that everyone goes through it so there's no need to be embarrassed."

"I feel more educated about different genders when they hit puberty."

"I learned more things you can use in periods other than pads."

"I will be less freaked out by puberty."

After the session 99% of pupils could name 3 places to go to for help or advice about growing up and puberty.

The most popular answer after the session was Childline, which was given by 84% of pupils. This was a rise from

12% before the session.

73% said that they would talk to a teacher and 68% to their parents / guardians.
