## HELPING HANDS - THEATRE IN EDUCATION PROGRAMME IMPACT REPORT





Since 1994, Loudmouth Education and Training has been supporting schools, organisations and partnerships with their violence prevention and safeguarding programmes.

Loudmouth creates and delivers theatre in education programmes to support children and young people to have healthy and safe lives free from abuse and violence. Loudmouth are West Midlands based and run over 1,000 sessions a year, to over 100,000 children and young people a year.

Helping Hands is Loudmouth's theatre in education programme for Year 4 to Year 6. This looks at staying safe on and off line specifically looking at child criminal and sexual exploitation/county lines and child and domestic abuse.

In 2023, Loudmouth ran a total of 234 sessions of Helping Hands, a theatre in education programmes on staying safe. RELATED

We reached 11,961 young people aged between 8 and 11 years old across the UK. The Helping Hands programme...

- Consists of performances, character/s Q&A and a workshop that includes local and national signposting to partner support organisations.
- Teaches the children the NSPCC PANTS rule e.g. privates are private, early warning signs their bodies may give them if feeling unsafe in situations and to create their own support network of trusted adults and organisations.
- Is led by Loudmouth's safeguarding trained actor/facilitators and are delivered in a safe, appropriate and trauma informed way.
- Can be run as live or virtual sessions.
- Is accompanied by teachers' resources to support our visits, this would include lesson plans, signposting information and parent/guardian support material.

After participating in the Helping Hands programme, 92% of pupils could name at least 4 of the NSPCC's PANTS rules.

This is a rise from 2% before the sessions.

99% of all students evaluated said they thought that the Helping Hands programme helps children to stay safe. Examples of why are shown below.

"Because Loudmouth is fun, so children understand better." "Because they teach you about things you might need in life."

"Because the PANTS rule is amazing!" "Because it helps you make the right decisions."


72% of pupils stated that as a result of the Helping Hands session they would act differently in the future. Example responses from students when asked 'how they would act or behave differently...'

"I will tell people the PANTS rule and stay safe online." "I understand my body rights and that nobody has the right to touch my body without permission."

"I know now when things aren't safe and who to tell." "I feel more safe and know that I can call Childline." After the session 92% of pupils could name 3 places to go to for help and support if they did not feel safe.

The most popular answer after the session was Childline, which was given by 66% of pupils.

This was a rise from 29% before the session.



99% of all students evaluated said they thought that they would recommend Helping Hands for next year's pupils.
